##### Next Steps:

- Katie will next work on ACES and childhood trauma PowToons.
- Hold off on catchment areas until the Regional Stewardship Committee reviews targeted populations.
- Do previously made PowToons need to be updated and tied back to the data book?
- PowToon publicity strategies include imagery for presentations and meetings focused on action. Videos can break up facilitation for a “break” between topics. There is potential to use it for groups not led by a member of our work group, such as maternal/child health groups, health care integration work group, staff meetings, Family Connects

#### **From Governor Brown – Bold Vision (lens for work)**

When the Student Success Act passed, House Bill 2025 awarded annual funding for expanding early care and education programs for infants, toddlers, preschoolers, and their families. This includes expanding additional slots for OPK, Early Head Start, and Preschool Promise.

The Early Learning Division provided protocol for reviewing and interpreting data to identify priority populations through PDG and local data. However, our data & evaluation work group existed before our LBL hub came into existence, and we have created a regional data book. This means that work required for the toolkit has already been completed in one way or another over the course of this work group. For example, the PDG data provided for Benton County doesn't include Alsea and their Kindergarten Assessment scores.

The work group plans to utilize the following three documents during this meeting:

- PDG data
- Regional data book
- Strategic investment recommendations document created by Lyndi.

Lynn took the ELD recommended populations and data from the Data Book, and created spreadsheets for each specific population. The spreadsheets will be reviewed by the Regional Stewardship Committee on Thursday:

- African American
- Pacific Islander/Asian
- Emergent Bi-lingual:
- Latinx:
- Geographically isolated: refer to regional data book for urban and rural communities.
- Children ages 0-2: priority population
- No immigrants and refugees: data not available.
- Migrant: data not available. Not applicable to our area.
- Tribal
- Developmental disabilities: identified only with IFSP. This is how many we know who are being served, but we don't know how many are in the total population.
- Incarcerated parents: data source unknown; further discussion is needed.
- Children experiencing homelessness/foster system: # based on preschool and k-12; how many are served?
- Poverty

#### Thoughts:

- Work group members who didn't participate in creating the regional data book will need additional time to review these documents in order to offer feedback. As well, the Regional Stewardship Committee might need additional context and explanation in order to fully understand the process to determining these prioritized populations.
- 2020 complete count committee

#### Next Steps:

- We need clarity on existing and expanding OPK slots.
- Boil down data handouts created by Lynn: Do kids in this priority population live in our region? How many of them are (total numbers)? How many are being served in a state-funded program? What is the percent? Do we know where these children reside geographically? Slice this out by county if necessary. Include asterisk with how many of these children are served.
- Eric will send Lynn the total # of kids ages 0-6 served in each center that isn't in Albany/Corvallis areas. As well,
