- Oregon’s county-based risk status is based on alternating Warning Weeks and Movement Weeks. The current week is a Warning Week. See the attached infographic for better understanding of the process Oregon is using.

- Governor Kate Brown and the Oregon Legislature have made it illegal for landlords to evict their tenants if they can’t pay their rent due to financial hardship. This policy is in place until June 30, 2021. Renters must complete, sign, and return a form to their landlord to prevent eviction. - Oregon Health Authority has expanded its multilingual Safe + Strong education and outreach campaign with a new theme and materials to help communities find simple, culturally specific information on safely connecting with family and friends this winter. The site’s “Make a Plan” page at <https://www.safestrongoregon.org/make-a-plan> contains reminders and information on what activities are low, medium or high risk for spreading COVID-19. Materials and resources are available in 12 languages.

- Based on preliminary data, Oregon has not seen an increase in the number of suicides for the first eleven months of 2020 when compared to the same time period in 2019. This is also true when compared to the average number between 2016 and 2019. Until finalized data become available, it is premature to identify any changes since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. - COVID-19 Vaccination has started in Oregon! See the attached infographic with OHA's current prioritization for vaccination.
- OHA has named 27 individuals to a Vaccine Advisory Committee to make further decisions about how to distribute COVID-19 Vaccine. There were over 600 applicants to serve on the Vaccine Advisory Committee. Cherity Bloom-Miller, RN from the Siletz Tribal Clinic was chosen as a member to help make these important decisions. - A recent study by the University of Oregon found that 24% of Oregonians were unwilling to get the COVID-19 vaccine, and 33% are uncertain. However, the study also found that people who were uncertain about getting the vaccine often held the inaccurate belief that they would contract COVID from the vaccine, a belief that can be countered in many people with effective messaging. In addition, many were worried about the side effects of the vaccine, a fear that may be alleviated as more people get the vaccine and public health officials learn more about potential side effects. Phase 1A December 12, 2020

Everyone in Phase 1, Groups 1,2,3 and 4 are currently eligible for the vaccine.

Group 1

- Hospital staff with frontline patient care responsibilities
- Urgent care
- Skilled nursing and memory care facility healthcare personnel (HCP) and residents
- Tribal health programs
- Emergency medical services (EMS) providers and other first responders
- All health care interpreters and traditional health workers in any setting within Phase 1a

Group 2

- Other long-term care facilities, including all paid and unpaid HCP, all staff and contractors, including residents who meet the age requirements of:
 - Residential care facilities
 - Adult foster care
 - Group homes for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities
 - Other similar congregate care sites
- Hospice programs
- Mobile crisis care and related services

- Individuals working in a correctional setting

Group 3

- HCPs in outpatient settings serving specific high-risk groups
- Day treatment services
- Non-emergency medical transport (NEMT)
- Paid or unpaid caregivers (including parents or foster parents) of medically fragile children or adults who live at home
- Adults and age-eligible children who have a medical condition or disability who receive services in their homes

Group 4

- All other outpatient HCPs
- Other HCP who provide direct service to people with I/DD and other high-risk populations.
- Other public health settings, such as HCP serving WIC, or CBO's with direct or indirect exposures

Subsequent groups will be determined in coordination with the Vaccine Advisory Committee and shared on OHA's COVID-19 vaccine web page. These are examples of groups of people who may included:

- Critical workers in high-risk settings — workers who are in industries essential to the functioning of society and substantially higher risk of exposure
- People of all ages with underlying conditions that put them at moderately higher risk
- People in prisons, jails, detention centers, and similar facilities, and staff who work in such settings
- General population

* Oregon's vaccine supply is limited. It is estimated to take 12-15 weeks to vaccinate groups 1-5 of Phase 1B.

Medical Director, Family Connects Oregon

Qualifications: M.D., D.O., N.P., C.N.M.

Area of Specialty: Pediatrics, OB-GYN, or Family Medicine

Level of Support: 0.1 FTE

Up to 0.1 FTE is necessary for this role.

The Medical Director must have expertise in at least one of these three areas: OB-GYN/midwifery, infant/maternal mental/behavioral health, or pediatrics. The Medical Director should collaborate with other specialists in areas that are not his/her specialty to cover all the above. The Medical Director is responsible to review and approve statewide clinical guidelines for both infant and mother/caregiver. Infant physical assessment is more comprehensive in the home visit than maternal physical assessment.

Roles and Responsibilities in collaboration with OHA (Family Connects Oregon and Nurse Consultant teams):

- Serve as Family Connects Oregon lead clinical advisor.
- Clinical guidelines
 - Review local feedback on statewide clinical guidelines for maternal and infant assessment.
 - Approve statewide clinical guidelines and procedures for maternal and infant assessment.
- Family Connects model fidelity
 - Contribute to the development of state-level recommendations for:
 - Site progress toward achieving FC Program Core Competencies
 - Utilization of weekly case conferences
 - Optimization for newborn enrollment through referring hospitals
- Clinical workforce development
 - Contribute to creation of state-level recommendations for professional development/continuing clinical education as identified through the Family Connects quality assurance process.
- Clinical provider engagement
 - Enhance collaboration with pediatric and maternal care practices statewide to identify champions.
 - Build relationships with site Clinical Champions and other clinical stakeholders in coordination with other members of the Family Connects Oregon leadership team.
 - May collaborate with other specialists in areas that are not his/her specialty (i.e., pediatrics, OB-GYN, infant/maternal mental/behavioral health).
