# MONTH-END DETAILS

### Revenue:

In the month of March, we received \$8,333 for Family Connects, \$32,822 for Coordination, and \$10,000 for Pollywog. These are all our regular monthly revenues. We also received our quarterly revenue for Coordinated Enrollment in the amount of \$58,564. We got \$46,963 for Title IV-B2 and \$17,326 for KPI reimbursement grant.

### **Expenditures:**

Wages came to a total of \$47,168.65 for the month of March. The benefits total was \$33,206.94. And the total for services and supplies came to a total of \$7,533.07. These expenses come from Pollywog, Family Connects, Coordination, and Coordinated Enrollment. We also had reimbursable expenses for Title IV-B2 in the amount of \$46,963 and \$17,326 for KPI.

### Other Information:

We received reimbursement requests from 3 partners for Title IV-B2 and 4 partners for KPI.

DISCUSSION ITEM Welcome and Introductions Board Members introduced themselves. Shelagh introduced herself as the newest Board Member. Ana Reyes was introduced as the newest EL Hub staff member.

SPECIAL Overview of the Regional System Assessment **PRESENTATION** 

Regional System Assessment (RSA) is a new deliverable in our contract and is due at the end of April 2023. Kristi shared the Regional System Assessment process and system map with the Board to gather feedback before it is submitted.

She explained that a regional system assessment is a process to understand how conditions within regional programs, organizations, systems, and communities are helping and hindering the Raise Up Oregon objectives and ultimately affecting whether children are getting ready for kindergarten and families are healthy, stable, and attached with fewer disparities.

All Early Learning Hubs were asked to focus on Raise Up Oregon Objective 2 for their RSA. Objective 2 states, "Families have access to high-quality (culturally responsive, inclusive, developmentally appropriate) affordable early care and education that meets their needs." Kristi reviewed the approach taken to ensure we met all the required pieces and deliverables of this RSA while respecting our partners' time and capacity.

We worked with partners through Jam Board to define Objective 2 and its meaning for our region. Kristi shared those definitions.

The Board noted that they would like to add flexibility to the "Meets Family Needs" definition.

The next part of the deliverable asked us to explore common Ecosystem Conditions for Objective 2, including environmental resources, human resources, financial resources, program and opportunity components, policies and practices, connections, decisionmaking, goals, and shared mindsets. Our EL Hub summarized partner feedback on what is helping and hindering this objective in our region.

Next, we worked to discover the root causes of these barriers.

- Issue 1: Many families are unable to access ECE that is high-quality, affordable, and meets their needs and preferences.
- Issue 2: Not enough ECE slots that meet families' needs and preferences.
- Issue 3: Not enough ECE workforce who represent communities served and can deliver high-quality ECE.
- Issue 4: Low wages and benefits paid to the ECE workforce.

The root causes can be divided into three categories

- Local Regional root causes (this is the focus of the Regional Stewardship Committee)
- Broader System Root Causes (Hubs and ELD to partner in addressing these)
- ELD operational root causes (ELD is working to address these internally)

Kristi reviewed the Raise Up Oregon Objective 2 System Map, created to summarize all this work and call out what is within our scope of influence.

The Board noted that families balance preschool and child care and that the need for coordination may not be reflected in the map.

# **DIRECTOR'S REPORT** LBL Hub Updates

Kristi shared that the Olalla Center will be stepping back and not offering Relief Nursery services. The Early Learning Hub is working on learning more about this situation and how we can support the transition to another organization becoming a Lincoln County Relief Nursery.

The Board asked if Olalla needs more support to meet the requirements of being a relief nursery and offered help connecting families to their services. It was suggested that the Systems of Care Council might be able to provide support.

LeAnne as, an Olalla Board member, shared that Olalla Center is preparing a press release. Some of the reasons being shared for this change at Olalla Center are that they are not finding enough families to serve and their high staff turnover. They plan to work with other agencies to find another location for a relief nursery.

Lola shared an email she received from Olalla about the changes to their early childhood programming.

Bettina shared that outreach and home visiting can be essential for the Relief Nursery model in a rural area. Relief Nurseries offer mental health support but through the lens of early childhood. Oregon laws require Relief Nurseries to raise 25% of their funds locally.

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There was a discussion of pulling together Lincoln County partners to find a Relief Nursery option. Funding for the 2023-25 biennium is about to close in the legislature. Action must be taken quickly to preserve Lincoln County Relief Nursery funding. Kristi will send a message to coordinate this effort in the next few days.

Kristi shared that the El Hub has been having conversations with the Lebanon School District, and there's an interest in starting up a pre-K at one of their elementary schools. Also, the high school is interested in starting a CTE program. There is an opportunity to have students interested in the early childhood education field and taking the classes and having that preschool at the elementary school site, being a lab model for them. So, we're going to continue that conversation.

Kristi talked with Mid-Valley STEM Hub. They have focused on early learning STEM and working with early childhood providers. There is a possible collaboration in the future, thinking about KPI funds potentially being used to offer shared STEM professional development opportunities to early childhood and early grade providers.

Kristi reminded the Board of the Legislative folder in the Basecamp group. The latest legislative updates and the bills we're tracking are being shared there.

Tomorrow, April 7th, is the LBCC Inservice. EL Hub staff will meet together to review branding guidelines, templates, and software.

LeAnne shared that the HCI workgroup is working on the Asset Mapping project. The pilot project will be in Harrisburg. Then will move to Philomath and Monroe, followed by 14 other potential cities. This will be the special presentation to the Board next month.

This workgroup will continue to support the Kindergarten Readiness metric with Katie Walsh.

#### PROGRAM UPDATE Family Connects Update

Connie shared the Family Connects population reach data. She mentioned an upcoming site visit from Family Connects International, the reimbursement rate change happening in July, and that Pollywog is reapplying for the Community Lead designation for Family Connects.

#### PROGRAM UPDATE Coordinated Enrollment Update

Kristi shared the current data for Preschool Promise, including applications received, new eligible children, number of open slots, and percentage of providers at capacity. The Coordinated Enrollment manual for 2023-24 was received. Matt is making a final review of documents to check for compliance with the manual. Matt was able to embed Google Translate into the Preschool Promise application. It is now available in 10 languages.

### Accomplishments:


- Applied for the following grants for use with media buy advertising costs associated with the Growing Care campaign (officially named!):








# Family Connects Update, May 2023

### **Data Discussion**

Scheduling Outcomes, January-March, 2023

There was a total of 434 eligible births in our area, January through March. This chart shows the various outcomes of attempts to schedule a Family Connects visit with these eligible families.



### **Program News**

**Community Lead Designation** – The Early Learning Hub has been informed by the nursing supervisors at each local health department that they would like to bring program coordination and community alignment internally following the end of the current contract. For the remainder of this contract cycle, we will be working with the health departments to transfer over work that Early Learning Hub staff have been completing on their behalf.

Family Connects and Healthy Families Collaboration – Locally, Family Connects and Healthy Families have strong connections due to professional relationships among staff in both programs. Now both programs are working to increase the contact between home visitors in order to better serve the families in the region. This is being facilitated by Jeff Quinn, OHA consultant with an FCI background. During a recent meeting, Healthy Families Program Manager, Natalee Rothstein, and Family Connects Community Alignment Specialist, Connie Adams, discussed ways the programs work together currently and areas for improvement. Jeff remarked on these existing relationships and how they could be a model for other Early Adopter regions in Oregon.

**New for Nurses** – A few short news items related to the Family Connects nurses.

- The First Annual Family Connects International Nursing Awards are going on now, and winners will be announced during Nurses Week in May.
- Family Connects International is forming a Nursing Advisory Board for critical feedback, collaboration and communication.
- Lincoln and Linn Counties are currently seeking qualified candidates to become Family Connects Nurse Home Visitors in their counties. Information can be found via each county's hiring communications.
